

WHAT DOES A REPORTABLE DISEASE OR FOREIGN ANIMAL DISEASE LOOK LIKE?

FOREIGN ANIMAL DISEASES INCLUDE:

- Foot and mouth disease (FMD)
- African swine fever (ASF)
- Highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI)
- Classical swine fever (CSF)

ALL FOREIGN ANIMAL DISEASES ARE REPORTABLE

REPORTABLE PROGRAM DISEASES INCLUDE:

- Aujeszky's disease (pseudorabies)
- Bovine tuberculosis
- Brucellosis (*Brucella abortus*, *Brucella suis*)
- Chronic wasting disease (CWD)
- Equine infectious anemia (EIA)
- Equine viral arteritis (EVA)
- Scrapie

THE LIST OF REPORTABLE ANIMAL DISEASES WILL VARY DEPENDING ON THE STATE YOU LIVE IN

ALL FOREIGN ANIMAL DISEASES ARE REPORTABLE

REPORTABLE DISEASES OR FOREIGN ANIMAL DISEASES MIGHT LOOK LIKE:

- Nervous system signs (difficulty walking, circling, stargazing)
- Severe breathing problems
- Poor or no response to treatment
- Unusual external parasites or maggots
- Sudden increase in sickness or death
- Blisters on the mouth, hooves, or teats
- Sudden increase in abortions

ANY ONE OF THESE SHOULD BE INVESTIGATED BY A VETERINARIAN (OR STATE ANIMAL HEALTH OFFICIAL)

WHAT TO REPORT

- If an animal dies suddenly and was showing signs of a reportable disease, even if no diagnostic testing was done.
- Any unusual condition or instance of a high illness or death event.
- This includes all foreign animal diseases, infectious diseases, or livestock parasites that were not previously known to exist in your state.

HOW TO REPORT

- Veterinarians are the first line of defense in detecting reportable and foreign animal diseases.
- Call your State Veterinarian or State Animal Health Official (SAHO) if you don't have a veterinarian. Find your SAHO here: usaha.org/saho

WHEN TO REPORT

- All reportable diseases must be reported immediately to the SAHO for your state.
- When disease strikes your treatment options might be limited. The stronger your disease prevention program, the safer your operation will be from disease entering.
